Furlough Information, Updates & Options

Swine Influenza A (H1N1) & Staying Healthy This Flu Season The State Department of Health continues to identify cases of novel H1N1 Influenza A circulating in our communities here in Hawaii. CDC is working with local and state health agencies to investigate these cases. It has been determined that this virus is spreading from human to human. Here are some tips to help keep you, the children and families you work with healthy and safe:

1. **Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick too.**
2. **Stay home** from work, school, and errands when you are sick. Keep sick children at home. You will help prevent others from catching the illness.
3. **Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing.** Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
4. **Washing your hands and the hands of your children often** will help protect you from germs.
5. **Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.** Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.
6. **Practice other good health habits.** Get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids, and eat nutritious food.

Stop Flu at School The School-based Vaccination Program is an innovative partnership between the State of Hawaii Departments of Health and Education, the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools and Hawaii Catholic Schools. It aims to improve the health of Hawaii keiki, families and kupuna by preventing the spread of harmful influenza viruses. Through the program, all children attending Hawaii elementary and middle schools will be offered FREE seasonal flu vaccine at school, during the school day. Teachers and school staff can also receive the free vaccine. The program is voluntary for schools and students. Vaccinations will begin in October 2009. The 2010 Census: Everyone Counts – Every Hawaii ‘Ohana Counted Census forms will be mailed or delivered to households in March 2010. April 1st is National Census Day – Everyone is encouraged to use this day to complete and send forms back in the mail. Here are some interesting things regarding the Census:

1. **It only takes 10 minutes.** In the time it takes you to measure, wash, and push the “cook” button you can complete the Census!
2. **It is confidential.** Private information is never published and Census workers are sworn for life to protect your confidentiality. Violating the oath is a serious crime – a fine of up to \$250,000 or imprisonment of up to 5 years or both.
3. **The Census is used as the baseline for everything** – from federal funding to emergency planning.
4. **Census data is valuable.** Data from the upcoming 2010 Census will help determine if new political boundaries are needed as a way to ensure that all of Hawaii’s people are properly represented on a local and National level. The data can be used to help secure grants for community programs or create a community profile.

Keiki Injury Prevention Coalition (KIPC) On January 1, 2007 a law went into effect requiring children between the ages of four through seven to ride in a booster seat whenever traveling in a motor vehicle. The only exemptions are if the child is over 4'9" or if the vehicle has lap-only seat belts in the rear seat. The driver is held responsible for compliance with the law. Violators of Hawaii's Child Passenger Restraint Law are required to attend a 4-hour class and may be assessed a fine between \$100-\$500, depending upon the number of offenses. A Hawaii State tax credit of \$25 per year applies to the purchase of a booster or child safety seat. For more information and basic guidelines on the proper use
